

Traveling north or south on 5 Freeway, exit at Lyons Ave/Pico Canyon Rd. Turn east on Lyons Ave and continue 0.8 miles to 23802 Lyons Ave, Grand Panda restaurant on right just before Wheeler Road.

From east end of Santa Clarita, Grand Panda can be reached by going west on Soledad Canyon (or your road of choice) to left at Bouquet Canyon. Continue south as Bouquet Canyon becomes Railroad Ave. Turn left onto Oak Ridge Dr, then right on Via Princessa as it becomes Wiley Canyon Rd. Take Wiley Canyon Road to Lyons Ave. Left on Lyons. 

Bridgemasters, Gold Coast and Upland Trains had good buys on LGB, USA Trains, Bachmann and Bachmann Spectrum equipment. Look for Bachmann Eggliners coming very soon and more G-scale announcements in the pipeline.

















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Bob Frein's Freight Depot Facade Project

Freight Depot Facade Project

December 2016-January 2017

In the summer of 2016, I built a small station for my railroad. Nothing fancy, took some scraps of redwood and cedar I had laying around and threw something together. Because I only have one area on my small railroad for buildings, and it happens to be up against a fence, facades are a must. After a few months of looking at the station, I decided I needed another building and this time it was

going to be a freight depot.

I started out with cedar fence boards, ripped them down to the basic frame and sanded the exterior. I made openings for a door and a larger "barn type" door. I used some redwood bender board for the roof and platform overhang. I made the platform out of cedar as well and used redwood for the legs. The regular door is made from coffee stirrers and I have a jig for making that size door.

The platform is 16" long x 7.5" deep. The depot is 12" long x 3.75" deep and 10" tall.

I decided I wanted "board and batten" siding for the depot. I went to my local hobby shop and got strips of balsa and bass wood and applied them with glue. I added supports made of redwood to the overhang. At this point I stained the platform with an oak stain I had laying around. I also added cross support members to the platform.

Next I painted the entire depot (both sides) with a white, exterior, oil based primer.

I then hit the exterior with a coat of black paint so the white primer wouldn't show through, and it would dull the first coat of red paint that I put on. This red came out a bit brighter than what I wanted, but it works. The second coat, I added a little black to change the color a bit. I didn't like it so I did one more coat of the actual red color. I painted the trim white...barn colors as one friend said...but hey.... my railroad...my rules!










Now it was time to add the shingles. I ran a cedar fence board through the table saw about 1/8 of an

inch wide. Once I had a 5 foot strip, I used clippers to cut them into 1-1/2" sections.

I glued those onto the redwood roofing. I tried to









For the overhang, I cut the cedar strips on the band saw to give it a different look.





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Freight Depot Facade Project continued

Time for some lights. In my station, I used a 20 LED, battery-powered light set. It worked pretty well, but 20 lights was way too much and the LED's were bright white. After Christmas, I found 20 LED, Warm White, sets at OSH... on sale no less. I picked up a few of those and decided to give them a try. The warm white LED is much better than the bright white LED.

As for light fixtures, I walked up and down every aisle at Hobby Lobby and couldn't find what I was looking for. At Lowe's, I found 1/4" copper tubing end caps. I drilled a small hole for the LED light to fit through and glued them to the building over the door and on both sides. Not only does it direct the light downward, the copper adds a really warm glow, especially with the warm white LEDs.







Under the overhang in front of the barn door, I glued a 2" x 1.5" piece of aluminum foil as a reflector to diffuse light. I then drilled a hole to pop







through an LED that you can't see, but it casts a nice warm glow over the barn door and platform.

Some framing trim on the barn doors finished the facade. Total cost for this project: less than \$10 and about 5 hours of my time. Currently, I am rebuilding the station and hope to finish it in the coming months.

This year Dennis Packer created a Del Oro Chapter motorcycle clubhouse for the motorcyclists who park beside the Del Oro transport trailer.



STORYBOOK LANDS & WESTERN TOWNS AT THE 32nd NGRC

We'll finish our look at the towns of the 32nd NGRC with a quick glance of a couple of.. well, call them oddities or outliers that just don't fit our previous categories. For one of them, we'll head back to Jack Verducci's Crystal Springs for a look at his "Storybook Shortline."





Many of us have 'fantasy areas' of our layouts, places where Disney characters meet dinosaurs and fairy tales, and that's what Jack has done here. The trick is not just in his excellent modelling, but the realistic way he presents the fantasy scenes.

Finally, we'll look at Bill and Sandy Ralph's Porcupine Gulch, which happened to be winner of the "Best Small Layout" contest sponsored by Garden Railways last year. A sign over the gate to the back yard reads "Porcupine Gulch, Old West Family Fun for Everyone."

The layout itself is a delight-ful exaggeration of the Wild West, with mining trains on spindly trestles crossing chasms past windswept spires.
